QQI-FET Pathway to UCD Application Information

This guide is to support prospective Further Education and Training (FET) students explore their options and provide information on taking the next step in their education journey.

You can use a QQI Major Level 5 or Level 6 Award to apply for entry to specific programmes at UCD.

Application Requirements

You are eligible to apply for this progression route based on achieving a linked major award. For example, a QQI Major Award in Business Administration (5M2468) allows you to apply for Arts, Law, Social Policy and Sociology, Economics, Psychology and other programmes in UCD but not for the Computer Science or Veterinary Nursing programmes. Level 5 and Level 6 Major Awards are made up of a number of Minor Awards known as components. There may be specific component requirements for each programme— for example a Mathematics component is required to be included in your Major Award if you apply for Economics in UCD.

Different combinations of components lead to different Major Awards and each component has a credit value, typically between 15 and 30.

Component awards or achievement of less than 120 credits do not provide eligibility. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that his/her further education and training provider applies to QQI for a major award prior to application to the CAO.

For courses in UCD (except Sport, Health and Exercise Science, Sports & Exercise Management, Veterinary Nursing and all Nursing & Midwifery courses), the required components can be completed over multiple sittings leading to an appropriate major award. Due to the competitive nature of the specific courses mentioned above, scores will only be calculated where the appropriate major award is presented in a single sitting, together with all the required components and results.

A number of programmes in UCD require achievement in specific component awards, or additional awards such as mathematics or a language. Your FET College Guidance Officer will also provide you with assistance.

QQI forwards all results achieved by applicants to the Central Applications Office (CAO). It is essential that you provide your correct PPS number in the CAO application form. If you omit it or if it is entered incorrectly, your results won't be forwarded on time.





FET-QQI Scoring system

Once all of the above requirements have been met, the following system is then used to calculate the score.

Each level 5 and level 6 component is scored as follows: 3 for a Distinction

2 for a Merit 1 for a Pass

All UCD programmes require that you have a minimum of five Distinctions. This component score is then multiplied by the individual component credit value to a maximum of 120 credits (a total of 390 points).

Example: Applying for Agricultural Science in UCD with a Level 5 QQI Major Award Laboratory Techniques 5M3807.*

You must achieve a minimum of five Distinctions including a Distinction in a Mathematics component (or Grade O6/H7 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics) and a distinction in the Biology and Chemistry components as per example below.

Example: Applying for Science in UCD with a Level 5 QQI Major Award Laboratory Techniques 5M3807.*

For this course you must be awarded eight Distinctions achieving 390 FET points on the QQI-FET scoring system. You must also have a distinction in the Mathematics component and a distinction in two of the following, Laboratory Skills, Chemistry or Biology components. In 2024 it was not possible to offer all applicants with 390 FET points so random selection was applied.

Central Applications Office (CAO)

The Central Applications Office (CAO) is a centralised applications system that processes full-time undergraduate programme applications for the higher education institutes in the Republic of Ireland including UCD.

Applicants can use the CAO system to apply for undergraduate programmes across a mixture of universities and levels using a single application. The levels available on the CAO are Level 6 higher certificates, Level 7 ordinary degrees and Level 8 honours degrees.

Take your time when completing the application to ensure that you are picking the right course for you.

The CAO homepage provides you with a demonstration application to allow you to familiarise yourself with the process and each step before you apply.

Things to remember when completing your CAO application form.

- ◆ Consult the CAO Handbook which is available on the CAO website.
- ◆ List your programmes in order of preference
- ◆ Think about your work experience and consider if you would like to continue this path or change direction.
- When deciding on programmes, check any minimum entry requirements, deadlines, restrictions and supplementary information.
- Pay attention to CAO communications, deadlines and verify your application details. If you do not receive a Statement by June 1st, contact the CAO immediately.

I do believe that my QQI/FET courses only benefitted me in my pursuit of university. I have a solid foundation in many concepts which has aided my learning in many of my modules in UCD. What will going to UCD cost me?

Everyone knows the cost of living is difficult to manage at the minute and attending a fulltime third level course in UCD may be financially challenging. Listed below are the main fees for which you as a UCD student may be liable.

1. Programme Course Fee

The good news is that most undergraduate students attending UCD, which is a publicly funded third-level institution, do not have to pay tuition fees. Under the terms of the Free Fees Initiative, the Department of Further and Higher Education pays the fees to the colleges.

The criteria for eligibility for the Free Fees Initiative are:

- ◆ You must have been living in an EEA member state or Switzerland or United Kingdom (UK) for at least 3 of the 5 years before starting your course.
- BUDGET
- ♦ You must be one of the following, or have been granted one of the following:
 - A citizen of an EEA member state, Switzerland or the UK
 - Have refugee status, family members of refugees, those with leave to remain, and/or international protection
- ◆ You must be starting a full-time undergraduate course for the first time. However, you may also qualify for free fees if you:
 - Already hold a Level 6 or a Level 7 qualification and are progressing to a Level 8 qualification on the National Framework of Qualifications, or
 - Previously attended a course but did not complete it, and are returning to study an approved course at the same level after a break of at least 3 years.

2. Student Contribution Levy

This annual levy is also known as a registration fee and it covers student services and examinations. The maximum rate of the UCD student contribution for the academic year 2024-2025 is €2,000.

If you are getting Back to Education Allowance (BTEA), you may qualify for exemption from the student contribution.

If you are eligible and are awarded a SUSI grant your Student Contribution Levy may cover the contribution.

3. Student Centre Levy

This Levy must be paid by the student and provides you, as a student of UCD, the opportunity, support and facilities required to enjoy student life outside of the lecture theatre. It helps support the provision of facilities clubs and societies the it also grants you access to two gyms and over 100 fitness *classes* per week at UCD Sport & Fitness.

While there are costs associated with attending third-level, there are steps that can be taken to reduce or minimise those costs.



Budgeting for life in UCD

It is important to be aware of your income and expenditure before you begin your academic year. Preparing a budget prior to commencing your year, reassessing it monthly and adjusting, when necessary, will assist you in this goal. See sample below to guide you to think about the income and your expenses.

Check out deals

According to switcher.ie, the average electricity customer could save up to €327 a year by switching from a standard tariff to the cheapest deal on the market, and the average gas customer can currently save up to €213 by switching to the cheapest deal.

Cycling

For those who like to cycle, **UCD Bikes** have a Buy Back Scheme offering to buy back any bike it has sold to a student for up to 50% of the purchase price. Scan the QR Code to find out more information.

Dublin Bikes a service that may save you money. An annual subscription for students with a valid ID is €20 and the first 30 minutes of every journey is free. After this, rental charges apply in accordance with the company's fees structure.

Leap Card

Young Adult Leap Card: is for those aged 19-25 year olds. This allows for 50 per cent fare reductions on Bus Éireann, Dublin Bus, Iarnród Éireann (including the Dart), Go-Ahead Ireland, Luas, and participating TFI Local Link services.

A daily and weekly cap has been put on the amount you can spend while using your Leap Card. Once you hit the cap, you travel free for the rest of the day or week.



For example, the weekly cap for a student using the Dart is €14.80. Students who have not yet reached their 19th birthday are eligible for even cheaper child fares, meaning they will get a week on the Dart for a €10.

Student Leap Card: is available for students in full time education who are either 16 -18 years of age or 26 years and above.

Trying to reduce your outgoing expenditure will help as will applying for grants, scholarships and bursaries outlined on the following pages for which you may be eligible.

The grant is means-tested, based on your family's gross income for the previous full tax year, so for those entering university in 2025, it financial, social and would be the 2024 accounts.

If a family has more than one child in college at the same time, the reckonable income limits are increased. The distance a person normally lives from the college is also a factor in how much an individual is eligible to receive. For details on the Student Grant Scheme and other important information see the SUSI website.

Use the SUSI eligibility indicator to check your eligibility.

Back to Education Allowance (BTEA)

If you are unemployed, a lone parent, or you are receiving a disability allowance from the Department of Social Protection, you may be able to participate in a second or third level education course and get a Back to Education Allowance (BTEA)

It is important to note that you cannot be in receipt of both the BTEA and the maintenance component of a student grant. In order

to receive the BTEA, you must accept your place on a full-time course, and then notify the Department of Social Protection by completing the BTEA application form.

All of the scholarships require that you satisfy one of specific eligibility criteria which include: Student with a disability, first-time mature student, member of the Traveller community, Further education award holder, lone parent who are in receipt of a means-tested social welfare payment, a member of an ethnic minority, a refugee, or with leave to remain, and international protection and a student who have successfully completed a UCD Access Programme.

There may be variations in eligibility criteria for some of the scholarships listed below so consult the ucd.ie/all website or email all@ucd.ie for further information.


Funding from Charitable organisations

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul recognises the importance of further education. However, for many people accessibility and affordability are real barriers to obtaining a third level education and training.

The SVP Education and Training Bursary Fund has been established to support students of all ages who may financially struggle to access or stay in third level education and training programmes.

The Bursary Programme will consider all recognised third level education and training programmes for funding. However, postgraduate studies (Master or PhD) or private colleges are not eligible.

UCD School Specific Scholarships

Specific Schools in UCD may have scholarships available for students who satisfy specific criteria. For example, The UCD Lochlann Quinn School of Business awards the KPMG Denis O'Connor Memorial awards. These awards are designed for promising students whose circumstances may present challenges towards fully accessing and availing of college opportunities. Each year, four scholarships are awarded based on merit, achievement and enabling impact. Overall, the programme's goal is to assist scholars to thrive in their college experience and to widen and deepen participation across the learning community.

Part-Time Courses

You may feel that you do not you do not want to start a fulltime course yet. There are a number of part-time courses available in UCD which will give you a taste of UCD.

Access courses - Preparing you for college life

The UCD Access courses are ideal if you want to study an undergraduate degree but don't quite feel ready or don't fully meet the admission requirements. These courses are designed to help you find your feet, explore subject choices, and develop your study skills before you take that next step. UCD offers a range of Access options depending on what you hope to study and the time you can commit.

Open Learning Pathways

This is UCD's most flexible part-time study option. You can build your own timetable, choosing from more than 200 modules taken directly from UCD undergraduate degrees. You will participate in classes, labs and tutorials with full-time students. This is an excellent way to try out the university experience.



There are 2 NFQ awards available through Open Learning: a 30 credit (6 modules) NFQ Level 7 Certificate, or a 60 credit (12 modules) NFQ Level 7 Diploma. Students who complete the Certificate with the necessary GPA may apply for direct admission into 13 UCD degree programmes.

All students who enter UCD through the FET Pathway and have a disability are eligible for all of the Disability Supports available at UCD.

UCD students with a disability or significant ongoing illness have the opportunity to receive relevant reasonable accommodations or supports. Documentation confirming the disability or significant ongoing illness is required in order to receive supports. These supports are related to the student's needs and may include academic supports such as awareness supports for your lecturers and/or exam supports such as extra time for exams.

Each year you are registered as a UCD Student your disability supports will roll over, there is no need to have another Needs Assessment meeting each year.

Examples of classroom accommodations used by students in UCD include:

- Use of Assistive Technology such as a recording device in lectures, if eligible.
- ◆ Provision of an Irish Sign Language (ISL) Interpreter and/or Note Taker for Deaf students, if eligible.
- Provision of required reading in an alternative format for Blind or visually impaired students, if eligible.
- The student's lecturer is made aware of their disability, if desired.

Assistive Technology.

Assistive Technology (AT) is a range of tools that make learning more accessible. This includes, for example, software that helps with spelling and grammar, digital pens or software for recording lectures, adapted tools for those with visual or hearing impairments, and alternative inputs for students with mobility issues.

UCD Access & Lifelong Learning has an Assistive Technology Specialist who can provide technology and training to students who avail of disability support.


