INTRODUCTION

The papers of Michael Tierney were deposited at the Archives Department of University College, Dublin by the Tierney family in July, 1983.

The papers span the years 1912 to 1974 - the start of Tierney's studies in UCD for the BA in Ancient Classics to his death in 1975. Tierney's life is well documented by his papers which were, on the whole, kept in good order. Notes which he made as a student are to be found in exercise books and notebooks. Notes he made later in life for lectures were usually to be found together in bundles, as were drafts and notes made for publications. Papers relating to his political career, excluding correspondence, were also to be found in bundles throughout the collection although there were a few 'stray' documents. Those relating to election campaigns such as those for his candidature for the NUI constituency or for the Senate would contain election manifestos, drafts of speeches, lists of supporters and so on. Items relating to particular issues that Tierney was involved with, such as the Censorship Bill, 1928 to 1929, would be found in separate bundles. All documents, including correspondence, relating to Fine Gael were kept together in one file. One section of documents which was exceptionally well organised was that relating to the post-retirement period of Tierney's life. All documents, almost without exception, from 1965 to 1974 were to be found together - the correspondence had been organised into subject related files such as all relating to articles he wrote. Letters written to Tierney throughout his life were organised, regardless of subject matter, in a broadly chronological order - although this pattern was not always adhered to. Memorabilia gathered throughout his life was usually to be found in files or and one could usually see a subject envelopes connection between the items - for example memorabilia collected during conferences he attended; or there would be a chronological connection - such as memorabilia collected when he was a student.

The papers fall easily into the 'sections' of Tierney's life from his student career to his retirement. His academic career is represented in the collection from about 1912 to 1964. After his student career at UCD and at various other third level institutions he became Assistant lecturer in Ancient Classics. In 1923 he became Professor of Greek in UCD and in 1947 he became President of that institution until his retirement. These academic aspects form the first 3 main level headings of arrangement. Study and lecture notes which he made as a student (LA30/1-42) are described summarily since they are contained in book form; notes for lectures which he made as Professor of Greek were found in 3 separate bundles and are contained in loose pages. These bundles have been maintained (LA30/90-92) with no attempt to rearrange their original order. The subject matter breakdowns of level heading I follows the career of

Tierney as a student starting with the Master of Arts which he took in 1915 through to his Assistantship in Ancient Classics. At the time of his Assistantship, Tierney was also travelling around Europe, hence, the two areas tend to overlap. Job applications within this section (LA30/70-72) are those other than his application for the post of Professor of Greek which is dealt with in level heading II.

In level heading II, the section on NUI business is largely made up of letters from staff and students both of the NUI and of other academic institutions. Letters from staff copious and relate mainly to the setting of exams and the appointment of staff - these have been dealt with as a compound item (LA30/104). Other more interesting letters. and letters which do not fall into the pattern of LA30/104 have been described singly. Communications from students include copies of their theses. Also included within this section is material relating to the civil service examinations (LA30/144-46) for which Tierney was an examiner in Greek and Latin from 1932 to 1936. The level heading relating to Tierney's Presidency - III - follows a similar pattern to level heading II. One particular point of interest is the section relating to the Court case - Hackett v Tiernev (III C). As well as numerous letters of sympathy that were written to Tierney, there is a typed draft of the appeal case with MS amendments (LA30/156).

The fourth level heading relates to the administrative bodies of both the NUI and UCD. This has been broken down into the Senate and the Convocation of the NUI and the Governing Body and the Academic Council of UCD. The sections mainly contain agendas and minutes of meetings. One particular item of interest is an inquiry made by the Academic Council (LA30/188) which raises the question of UCD's stance on the issue of religion.

Level heading V relates to scholarly pursuits and has been broken down into publications written by Tierney of an academic nature, functions which he attended, and his membership of societies. Many of the publications contain one and sometimes two drafts in MS form, such as LA30/198 on the Orphic mysteries. Memorabilia from particular (V Bi) give an indication of Tierney's frequent representation, both for the NUI and for Ireland, at various continental conferences - in particular, the Congress of Europe LA30/239-241. Items in section D of this level heading - other areas of interest - are largely letters to Tierney relating to the particular areas in question - they are described singly. Many of the themes such as education in Ireland (V Di) and the Irish language (V Diii) are prevalent issues throughout the whole collection, however, particular items of interest have been picked out and highlighted in this section. Letters to Tierney in this level heading are largely of a routine nature - such as those from people inviting him to functions (LA30/255/3) and have been described as compound items.

The political section, like the academic section, follows the course of Tierney's career in politics - from being TD for North Mayo from 1925 to being elected onto the Seanad in 1938 and 1943. Issues with which he was involved have been listed within each of the sections - such as his opposition to the Censorship Bill (LA30/353) in 1928 which came at the time of his representation for the NUI constituency. Items which made up the bundle relating to the UIP have been maintained together under VI C. Of particular interest are the various drafts of the heads of policy which show the path of the UIP (LA30/342-343), the reports written by Tierney which not only show the policies of the UIP but also Tierney's own political stance (LA30/349-362), and letters written to Tierney which show the political stance of many of his colleagues at this period (LA30/363-369). The personal letters written to Tierney in this level heading (VI Hii) are those which relate to the general political situation in Ireland and reflect the personal views of Tierney's friends such as LA30/407 - in which Liam O Briain discusses the success of Eamon de Valera in the 1944/45 period.

The retirement material (VII) has been kept together. The section has been arranged along the lines of the previous level headings - academic matters first, followed by scholarly pursuits, and then personal matters. Tierney was still involved in NUI matters at this time - in particular the merger issue of UCD and TCD (LA30/424-425); he was also still attending functions and writing articles. Just before his death, Tierney completed a publication on Eoin MacNeill, his father-in-law, which has been published with an introduction by F X Martin - this gives a fairly detailed biography of Tierney's life.

Level heading VIII contains personal letters to Tierney from friends and family. The letters relate solely to personal matters such as family issues and the personal progress of his friends. Letters from friends - especially in the early period (1919-1923) - are particularly interesting from the point of view of giving details of various countries on the Continent at this time such as letters from friends in Berlin in the 1921 to 1923 period (LA30/445-446). Letters from A W Lawrence (LA30/444) are interesting both from the point of view of his travels in Europe and North Africa and because of his letter writing skill. Where letters are routine they have been described as compound items - the more interesting ones have been picked out for single description or for description as smaller compound items where the author is the same.
