Mary McSwiney papers

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#### Introduction.

Ph8a is part of a collection of papers deposited in the Archives Department, U.C.D. by Mr and Mrs Ruarai Brugha in November 1979. The collection has been divided into three parts. Ph8a consists of the papers of Nary McSwiney, Ph8b of the papers of her brother Terence McSwiney, while Ph8c includes the working papers and correspondence of Terence McSwiney's biographers, Etienette Beuque and Moirin Chevasse.

Mary MacSwiney was born in London on 27 March, 1872, the eldest of nine children two of whom, Eugene and John, died in infancy. The others were Catherine, Peter, Terry (Terence), Margaret, Anne and John. Her parents were John MacSwiney and Mary Anne Wilkinson. The family returned to Ireland when Mary was six years old. Her father entered into a partnership with his father-in-law in a tobacco and snuff factory. The venture was however unsuccessful, and when the business collapsed, John MacSwiney decided to go to Australia where he had some relatives, amongst them his father's cousin, Dr. Murphy, the Archbishop of Tasmania. While it had been hoped that his health would improve, this was not to be the case and he died in Melbourne on 17 October, 1895. Mary MacSwiney was to receive support from Australia and Dr. Mannix, Archbishop of Melbourne, was involved in St. Ita's School, (P48a/25).

Mary was educated first at St. Marie's of the Isle School, and when St. Angela's opened she was transferred there, attending from the first day of its opening. Her education was, however, dogged by the ill fortune of her delicate health. She injured her foot on her First Communion day, and the injury troubled her greatly thereafter, necessitating several periods of hospitalization and interruption of school work. At one time she spent almost a year in hospital. In the end the foot had to be amputated from above the ankle joint and she had to wear a surgical boot.

It was very difficult for the family to make ends meet financially and Mary, Catherine, Terence and Peter were forced to work to supplement the family income. Mary herself, at the age of twenty, worked briefly at a private high school in England and then in France. She then decided to go to Cambridge and study for the University Teaching Diploma. On leaving Cambridge at the turn of the century, she taught at Hillside Convent, Farnborough (see P48a/3), and in 1904 she left to take up a post in the Benedictine Convent in Ventnor. It was at this stage that her mother died and Mary assumed headship of the family. In 1906 she left Ventnor, accepting a post at St. Angela's Ursuline High School, of which she was a past pupil. She remained there until dismissed in 1916. In the meantime she had furthered her studies with the Royal University of Ireland.

Mary became interested in the suffragette movement and was heavily criticized by Sinn Feiners for joining the Cork branch of the Suffragette organization. She did not, however, join Sinn Fein until the Ard Fheis of 1917, because she argued that it was not a completely Republican movement (papers relating to her activities in Sinn Fein are to be found at P48a/36-108). Only when in 1917 the Sinn Fein emphasis tilted towards Republicanism did she then join. She was throughout her life totally devoted to the concept of a sovereign independent Republic, and her later disagreement with E. de Valera was a reflection of this uncompromising stand against any dilution of this principle.

In 1914 she was instrumental in the formation of a Cork branch of Cumann na mBan and was to hold the post of vice-president of the national organization for many years. This aspect of her activities is reflected in P48a/8-24. During the war years she worked hand in hand with her brother Terence, and their activities were inseparable. Terence later became Lord Mayor of Cork, while at the same time Mary sat on the Governing Body of Cork University. Her political involvement led to her dismissal from St. Angela's after she had been briefly arrested and imprisoned following the Easter Rising of 1916. (See P48a/7). Together with her sister Annie she then founded St. Ita's School

which opened its doors in September 1916 with 30 pupils. She remained involved in the school throughout her life.

The death of Terence whilst on hunger strike was a profound experience for Mary and the family. She was invited to Washington to present evidence before an American commission which was investigating conditions in Ireland, and left Ireland on 3 December 1920. She is said to have made a profound impression during that visit, and Eamon de Valera, who was in America at the time but had been recalled to Ireland, asked her to stay on and complete his lecturing engagements. She lectured all over America, the main thrust of her activities being to mobilize support for the Republican cause. She subsequently made another tour of America in 1925. Papers relating to her American activities are at P48a/114-189.

While on her first American tour she had been elected to the Second Dail, and was recalled to Ireland to take part in the Treaty negotiations that were taking place. She was very critical of the compromises she saw being made, and made many speeches both in the Dail and outside, emphasizing the need to uphold the Republican ideal. P48a/251-353 shows her extensive involvement. She went on hunger strike twice when imprisoned by the governing authorities. In 1922 she was imprisoned in Mountjoy for 24 days by the Free State, and when after 13 days her sister Annie visited her and was refused admission, she also went on hunger strike outside the prison gates where she remained day and night. Mary's second hunger strike lasted for 21 days while she was in Kilmainham gaol. The use of the hunger strike as a political weapon was heavily condemned by the Church, and a bitter controcersy arose over this and the Church's lack of support for the Republican cause in general. This is documented in the papers P48a/190-232.

As events in Ireland unfolded Mary found herself increasingly at variance with some of her allies. She continued to stand by her ideals, and found herself unable to participate in Fianna Fail and wrote bitter letters to de Valera assuring him that his attempts to smash the Irish Republican Army would not succeed. Mary was a prolific writer, and files of her letters to the editor and articles (P48a/375-457) are testimony to this. She was an excellent public speaker, aided by her competent grasp of Irish, English, European and American history, which enabled her to draw parallels.

Mary MacSwiney died in 1942 at the age of seventy. Most of the biographical details of her life concentrate on the period before 1925 when she had her greatest impact. A biographical text by her sister, Mother Margaret MacSwiney, is at P48a/462, and details of her life can also be found in the book <u>Rebel Irishwomen</u>, written in 1935 by R.M. Fox, and published in Dublin and Cork by the Talbot Press Limited.

While the papers have been arranged in relation to the main areas of activity of Mary MacSwiney, the groupings are not rigid, and the papers are very much interrelated. Where an original order was discernible - for example, if there was a file relating to an individual or to a specific issue such as election deposits - this order has been preserved even though some of the papers of the same individual may be found elsewhere. Most of the correspondence has been arranged chronologically within the main areas of her activities.

In the section dealing with Dail Eireann, the occurance of the terms 'Government' and 'Dail Eireann' might in some instances be confusing, since there was both a Free State government and Dail and an 'alternative' Republican government and Dail after 1923 (see P48a/236). However, such confusion might be avoided by close attention to the context of the material. It was thought preferable to keep all the Dail Eireann papers together, rather than separate them into 'Free State' and 'Republican' Dail papers or into pre- or post-1922 papers, since they are, in the context of the Mary MacSwiney collection, an integral unit.
