# **TODD ANDREWS PAPERS**

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#### INTRODUCTION

The papers of Todd Andrews were deposited in University College Dublin Archives Department by his widow, Joyce, in January 1990. The papers span his lifetime and include documents both written by him and collected by him as research material for his autobiography. Together these offer the researcher a fairly complete picture of the character and life of Todd Andrews. The papers include non-textual material such as photographs and a cassette tape and where possible these are highlighted specifically.

Andrews was born in Summerhill, in the heart of Dublin city, in 1901, the first of two sons of Polly and Christopher Andrews. He was christened Christopher Stephen, but by his early childhood had acquired the nickname 'Todd'. The family, including Andrews' younger brother Patrick, moved to Terenure in 1910 from where his mother ran a creamery. His father worked with an auctioneering firm in Capel Street, Dublin. It was from this secure family base that Andrews was to begin a life-long service to his country. In 1917 he 'E' Company of the Irish Volunteers Rathfarnham. Andrews fought in both the War of Independence (1919-21) and on the Anti-Treaty side during the Civil War (1922 - 3). By 1926 he graduated with a commerce degree from UCD and was soon to embark on the career of the public servant with his involvement in many semi-state companies; from the Irish Tourist Association (ITA) in 1926, now Bord Failte, through to Radio Telifis Eireann (RTE) in 1970. Andrews involvement in these companies, many of which had just been established, was to provide guidance and direction during their formative years.

On retirement from life as a public servant Andrews refused to fade away quietly. He continued to put forward ideas and opinions in public and in private, mostly on paper, right up to his death. A more comprehensive picture of his life is to be found in his autobiography, volume one, **Dublin Made Me** and volume two, **Man of No Property.** 

The collection is arranged largely in chronological order and exhibits a bias towards research material relevant to his autobiography. This is covered in sections I and II. We gain a deeper insight into the character of Todd Andrews from his occasional writings, section III and correspondence section IV, supplementing his published life story. It was not only through his actions that Todd Andrews spoke but also, as this collection demonstrates, through his words, with letters written by Andrews or to him forming a significant part of the collection.

The collection, therefore, has four main sections, each further sub-divided. Section I covers background research material for his autobiography, spanning his involvement in the War of Independence to his role as Chairman of RTE. It offers particular insight into Andrews' times in prison (1920-4) from letters written by him (P91/1), and into the broader picture on the role of the Army at the time (P91/73). Some of the positions held by Andrews are documented more fully than others. This is probably an accurate reflection of his relative contribution to each company. The sub-group of documents concerning Bord na Mona in particular offers an almost complete history of the early years of the company. Various areas of conflict within particular companies such as the closing of the Harcourt Street line by CIE in 1959 are also documented, though not always referring to Andrews' specific involvement.

Section II concerns the physical production of Andrews auto-biography, including his early attempts at finding a publisher and the official launch of volume I. Also included are congratulatory letters, often from members of the general public, inspired by his books, each with their own tale to tell.

Section III documents Andrews' literary activities after his retirement from public life, in particular with his series of articles for the Irish Press which appeared under the title 'Gallimaufry'. Often Andrews committed his ideas to paper under a pseudonym, remaining acutely aware that what he had to say was often controversial and potentially damaging to the political careers of his sons, David and Niall.

The final section acts as a guide to Andrews life outside the public service, including his role as treasurer for the 'New History of Ireland' project. This section also includes personal correspondence of Andrews with close friends over a number of years and acts as a further insight into his opinions and character, often in a less formal manner than that reflected in his writing for the general public.

As a whole, this collection presents the researcher with a picture of the man and his work. It is hoped by those who were closest to him that his papers will provide ample research material for a biography. Clearly, anyone with an interest in any of the companies or associations Andrews was involved in would benefit from consulting his papers, as would anyone interested in the politics and politicians that played a major role in the early years of the state. Access to one file within the collection is restricted until the year 2000 and other related material is held by his children and is, therefore, not documented here.

Also writes of his escape from the Curragh, 'I was one of a number to make a somewhat sensational escape' (Sept 1921); hungerstriking 'the same old ordeal has to be endured again' (24 Oct 1923); and from Cork on peace prospects 'I do hope it comes very soon as already I[m] getting bored' (5 April 1923).

The weather is 'unbelievably hot' (17 July) and 'nostalgia is setting in' (17 July). Also included is a brief description of post-war London which Andrews passed through en route to Sweden.

He 'never realised how uncomfortable we are at home. Now I understand fully the complaints of the Americans' (11 Dec).

He notices that 'the rule here seems to be married women don't work but all single women do and at the heaviest work' (5 July). His colleague P J Cogan 'is unimpressed... quite unemotional' but Lewis Rhatigan 'has fallen completely' and 'talks of uprooting himself and coming to live here' (6 July). Andrews also describes the 'amount of trouble our turf friends took to get us to Mass was nobody's business'.

Joannon refers to comparisons between 'the Ulster question and the Algerian problem' about which he is 'not quite convinced'.
