WHY STUDY FRENCH?

To develop your skills in communication, reading, and critical thinking by exploring the language, literatures, and cultures of France and other French-speaking countries. To broaden your understanding of, and selfexpression in, a language that is both European and global (spoken on four continents). To equip yourself for a diverse society and workplace by enhancing your cultural awareness and intellectual flexibility.

WHAT WILL I LEARN?

You will study French language and French and francophone literature and culture, developing your linguistic and critical skills across a threeor four-year programme:

First Year: Foundations in language and literature

Second Year: Developing linguistic and analytical skills through a range of literature and cultural modules from the early modern to the contemporary periods

Final Year: Developing advanced linguistic proficiency while further developing critical thinking, across diverse specialist literary and cultural subject areas.

CAREER & GRADUATE OPPORTUNITIES?

The communication skills, critical thinking, cultural sensitivity and intellectual flexibility acquired through studying French provide a strong foundation for a wide range of careers, including Careers in the EU, International Business, International Relations, Public Administration, Education, Translation and Interpreting, Journalism and Media, Tourism. A BA in French is also a platform for further study via an MA in Modern Languages (French), an M.Litt. or PhD.

INTERNATIONAL STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

Students of French are required or strongly encouraged to spend a year abroad in one of the 15 universities with which we have exchanges in France, Canada and the Caribbean, thus graduating after four years with an international degree. The year abroad offers a unique opportunity to study at a francophone university and to become immersed in another language and culture. For most students, the year abroad is essential to achieving the linguistic fluency and cultural flexibility expected of language graduates by prospective employers.

OTHER VOICES, OTHER VIEWS

To study another language is to listen to another voice and to discover another view on the world. To study French, which is both a European and a global language, is to encounter multiple voices and multiple views. This explains why French at UCD has two main dimensions: not only the development of language and communication skills, but also the critical exploration of the literature and culture of French-speaking countries. If you embrace the study of French with its other voices and views, you will expand your intellectual horizons and nothing will ever sound or look quite the same again.
