First year: Reading Hispanic Texts and Hispanic Societies and Cultures and Catalan Language (as an option)

Second and Final Year: Language and options including Early Modern Spanish Literature, Film, Latin American Culture and Literature, Catalan culture and society, visual art and performance. Our core language classes engage with current social and cultural issues in Spain and Latin America and our research-led content modules are the product of years of investigation and passion for the specialism.

INTERNATIONAL STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

Spain has a fascinating history and culture, making it one of Europe's most interesting and exciting places to spend a year. Students are encouraged to apply to spend an additional year abroad with one of our several partner institutions, both in Spain and Latin America, which currently include: Mexico (Tec de Monterrey, Querétaro), Castilla La-Mancha, Deusto (Bilbao), PUC Santiago de Chile, Salamanca, Universidad de Montevideo (Uruguay), UPO (Sevilla), Valladolid, Valencia, Granada and Extremadura (Cáceres). Alternatively, many students apply to become English Language Assistants in schools throughout Spain, living and working among Spanish people, and experiencing the Spanish way of life at first hand. Whichever way students choose to spend their year abroad, it is highly recommended as an unparalleled learning experience.


