ARINS project on the future of Irish unity published in *The Irish Times*

Dr. Dawn Walsh (SPIRe, UCD) and colleagues Prof Brendan O'Leary (University of Pennsylvania) and Prof John Garry and Dr Jamie Pow (both Queens University Belfast) published articles in *The Irish Times* through 2025, sharing the findings of a major research project into attitudes to a possible future united Ireland and related issues both in the Republic and Northern Ireland. The findings are based on two major, in-depth opinion polls conducted simultaneously in Northern Ireland and the Republic. The overall aim of the collaborations and research is to provide independent and unbiased information on the state of public opinion in both jurisdictions on the constitutional future of the island, especially what influences the views of people, and how people may react to a united Ireland, if it were to happen. New research project on “Maternal Healthcare Paradoxes in India”

Smrutimayee Sarangi, a PhD candidate at SPIRe, started her project on maternal healthcare paradoxes in India. Her research uncovers a paradox: tribal women are more likely to receive antenatal care than non-tribal women, yet they are less likely to give birth in healthcare facilities. The research builds on the data from the Indian version of the Demographic and Health Survey. As India advances SDGs 3 and 10, her research highlights the need for culturally sensitive policies beyond financial incentives, as a one-size-fits-all approach may not be enough.

Elizabeth completed an undergraduate degree in UCD and began her master’s in Sustainable Development, a programme UCD offers with the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network.

I got to experience and use my studies in the professional world and gain an understanding of the Civil Service, NGOs and charitable work”

UCD Student Team Wins Runner-Up for Technical Excellence at Data4Good Festival

A team of five second-year BSc Computational Social Science students from University College Dublin has secured Runner-Up for Technical Excellence at the hosted by the [Hertie School](#) from 20–22 January 2025. At a three-day event, 70 students from 20 European universities gathered to network and create solutions to data challenges. Competing at the three-day Hackathon in Berlin, the ‘Byte Me’ team (pictured above) developed *Knowledge Link*. This online tool uses Large Language Models to make complex social data more accessible and actionable for policymakers and researchers. The team’s achievement at the Data4Good Hackathon showcases how computational social science can transform policymaking by making data-driven insights more accessible. New module on Political Communication and Propaganda

Given the recent developments of social media, misinformation and AI, a new module by Nikita Kohlov introduces students to the field of political communication, centered on the role of information and persuasion in political processes. It also teaches students how to recognize and counter the manipulations of information by media and politicians.

Doris Aja-Eke recently joined SPIRE as an Assistant Professor. Her research focuses on the impacts of corruption and sexual corruption (also known as sextortion) on national and international development, with an emphasis on influencing anti-corruption laws and policies with evidence-based research. She uses mixed methods research approaches and is interested in the broad areas of International Relations, Development Studies, and International Organisations.

Stefan Müller highly commended in Early Career Researcher of the Year Awards 2024

Now in their eighth year, [the Researcher of the Year Awards](#) are legacy awards from the Irish Research Council following its amalgamation with Science Foundation Ireland to form Research Ireland. Stefan Müller was highly commended in the Research Ireland Early Career Researcher of the Year (IRC Legacy) Awards 2024. The "highly commended" citation recognises outstanding and exceptional research. Stefan's work focuses on political representation, party competition, political communication, public opinion, and quantitative text analysis. He also contributes regularly to national and international media on Irish and European politics.

In addition, Krishna Vadlamannati was recognised as one of 67 "Research Allies," honouring the crucial role of mentors, supervisors, and research and technical support staff in supporting the academic research community across all career levels.



Lucia Tiscornia was a Finalist in UCD Research Impact Competition

Lucia Tiscornia was a finalist in the 2024 UCD Research Impact Case Study Competition. Through interviews and a large-scale survey, her project mobilised public opinion and motivated policymakers to address the sharp increase in gang-related violence in Montevideo, Uruguay. Lucia Tiscornia and the research team collected data about over 2,600 neighbourhood residents' experiences with criminal gangs.
